The St. Neots Local History Society, founded in 1981, exists to promote interest in the rich and varied history of the town of St. Neots and the surrounding area through monthly meetings, research and summer outings. Membership is open to anyone with an interest in the history of this town, or in local history generally.

During the summer we organise excursions to places of historical interest within the locality and sometimes further afield, led by members of the Society or by local experts. Historical information is collected and our archives are held in the St Neots Library. There is also an on-going programme to erect plaques to local celebrities throughout the town.

6 th January	The 2 nd World War Prisoner of War Camps in Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire by Kenneth Lewis (Keen 2 nd World War researcher) With the capture in North Africa of 35,000 Italians in 1941, five hundred Prisoners of War were sent to Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire to
	work. Hear the story of a number of escape attempts by both Germans and Italians which the British Government covered up.

3 rd March	Lady Margaret Beaufort - Saint or Schemer? by Margaret Badley (Former Senior Lecturer in War and History at De Montfort University) Margaret Beaufort was born at Bletsoe Castle, just north of Bedford, in 1443. She was a key figure in the Wars of the Roses and an influential matriarch of the House of Tudor (she was mother of Henry VII). She is also credited with the establishment of two prominent Cambridge colleges. Margaret Badley will give us a real insight into her life.
7 th April	The Gallipoli campaign by Keith Edmonds (Membership Secretary for The Gallipoli Association)
· · · · · ·	Hear how the 1915 Gallipoli Campaign changed the Great War into a World War. Planned to break the stalemate on the Western Front, over 500,000 Allied troops fought in appalling conditions as the Gallipoli peninsula became a scene of close-quarter combat. Death and disease seemed inevitable – as did the final outcome.
5 th May	One of the Few – The Memoirs of Wing Commander Ted 'Shippy' Shipman by John Shipman (Author of the book of the same title) John will tell us about his father, a farmer's boy who learnt to fly in his own time and flew Spitfires to defend his country. Based on the copious notes that 'Shippy' wrote in the 1970s the talk brings a first-hand insight into the life of an RAF Spitfire pilot during the early war years and his remaining wartime and post-war service until 1959.
2 nd June	The Kimbolton Hoard by Liz Davies (Curator of St Neots Museum)
	In advance of the exhibition in St Neots Museum during July to September, Liz will tell us about this exciting discovery of 68 gold Iron Age coins found at Kimbolton in 2010. These coins were in circulation 50 to 60 years before the Roman invasion of Britain and as such are amongst the earliest examples of money to be circulated in our island. Amongst other things, Liz will explore the reasons for their burial 2000 year ago.
7 th July	Guided tour: Visit to Castor Led by Jackie Cook (Member of the St.Kyneburgha Building Preservation Trust)
- pre-booking required	The church of St Kyneburgha at Castor is one of the finest Norman churches in England, packed with architectural, archaeological and historical interest. Not only that, but it stand on the site of a huge and important Roman building. Small sections of masonry from this Roman building are still preserved in a garden wall.
